The Birth of Jesus:

Comparing the Gospel Infancy Narratives

Introduction to Matthew 1–2 and Luke 1–2:

The birth of Jesus is narrated at the beginning of the **Gospel of Matthew and the Gospel of Luke**, but is not mentioned in Mark, and alluded to very differently in John. Although the story may seem familiar, a close analysis shows that there are *many significant differences* between the Matthean and Lukan accounts, with *hardly anything in common* between them. The following are the only commonalities, and even these contain significant differences in the details:

Common Elements in Both Infancy Narratives:

- Main characters: Mary, Joseph, Jesus
- Supporting characters: Angels, Holy Spirit
- Titles attributed to Jesus: Christ, son of David
- Heritage: children of Abraham/Israel, house of David
- Place names: Nazareth in Galilee, Bethlehem in Judea
- Historical period: during the reign of King Herod



Eleven Points Shared by the Infancy Narratives of Matthew and Luke (from Raymond Brown, *The Birth of the Messiah*, pg. 34):

- 1. The parents are to be Mary and Joseph who are "betrothed" (legally bound to be married), but have not yet come to live together or have sexual relations (Matt 1:18; Luke 1:27,34).
- 2. Joseph is of Davidic descent (Matt 1:16, 20; Luke 1:27,32; 2:4).
- 3. There is an angelic announcement of the forthcoming birth of the child (Matt 1:20-23; Luke 1:30-35).
- 4. The conception of the child by Mary is not through intercourse with her husband (Matt 1:20,23,25; Luke 1:34).
- 5. The conception is through the Holy Spirit (Matt 1:18,20; Luke 1:35).
- 6. There is a directive from the angel that the child is to be named Jesus (Matt 1:21; Luke 1:31).
- 7. An angel states that Jesus is to be Savior (Matt 1:21; Luke 2:11).
- 8. The birth of the child takes place after the parents have come to live together (Matt 1:24-25; Luke 2:5-6).
- 9. The birth takes place at Bethlehem (Matt 2:1; Luke 2:4-6).
- 10. The birth is chronologically related to the reign (days) of King Herod the Great (Matt 2:1; Luke 1:5).
- 11. The child is reared at Nazareth (Matt 2:23; Luke 2:39).

NOTE: The new "Liturgical Year" always begins on the First Sunday of Advent (Nov. 27 - Dec. 3), not on Jan. 1:

Advent 2021 was part of the 2022 liturgical year (Sunday Cycle C), which began on November 28, 2021. Advent 2022 will be part of the 2023 liturgical year (Sunday Cycle A), which begins on November 27, 2022. Advent 2023 will be part of the 2024 liturgical year (Sunday Cycle B), which began on December 3, 2023. Advent 2024 will be part of the 2025 liturgical year (Sunday Cycle C), which begins on December 1, 2024.

Seasons of Advent and Christmas

The Season of Advent:

Advent is not usually a full four weeks, but between three and four weeks long, depending on what weekday Christmas is in a particular year. Advent begins on the Sunday between Nov. 27 and Dec. 3. Thus, the readings listed here for the "Third Week of Advent" might not all be used, since the last eight days before Christmas use the readings assigned for Dec. 17-24, as listed at the bottom of this table.
